Displacement & Gender A Question of Memory & Action

A talk by Faiha Abdulhadi

The displacement of Palestinians in 1948 has formed a distinctive turning point not only in the Palestinian history, but also to a new political era that started and is still ongoing. When discussing the impact of the displacement on the Palestinians, men & women, it is to be noted that women impacted by the displacement have reflected certain particularity in addition to the common symptoms that impacted the Palestinian family and caused its dispersion.

A number of studies have tried to investigate the effect of the displacement on women, but no satisfactory results were reached. I am of the opinion that more satisfactory results could have been reached if these studies adopted the methodology of Oral History from women perspective.
